Dear Friends

God speaking through creation or the natural world means that when we look up at the stars or gaze at a Hampshire hill covered with wild flowers, we see the fingerprints of God. The more we fix our eyes on the wonder of creation, the more we must believe that these things could not possibly just make themselves. Both the intricate design of creation and the way the universe appears to be fine-tuned for life shout out that this is no accident. Think about this: If the electromagnetic force in atoms were weakened by a mere 4 percent, then the sun would immediately explode. If it were stronger, there would be fewer stable atoms. Oxygen level in our atmosphere is 21% - if it dropped there would be no animal life; if it reached 25% most plants would be consumed by fire. Our sun is just the right size to allow life to develop, and we are not so close that our orbit shows only one face to the sun, so that one side would be too hot to sustain life and the other too cold. Surely this is brilliant design!

God doesn't just speak through the order and design we find in creation, but also through the amazing beauty that surrounds us. Jane and I visited Australia and New Zealand last year and were overwhelmed by the variety of animals, trees, flowers and scenery we experienced. We felt that God was speaking to us through his masterpieces, when we watched with awe, the waves pound against the rocks at the Pancake Rocks at Punakaiki, and saw the hot springs and geysers at Rotarua. We had the same feeling when we held our newborn baby granddaughter Abigail for the first time upon our return. From something as mundane as a flock of geese travelling over our house at midnight this week, to the spectacular views of the stars on a crisp winter night, creation doesn't just tell us that a Creator exists, but that this Creator is an artist without peer.

Psalm 19:1-4 puts it this way: ***"The heavens declare the glory of God; the skies proclaim the work of his hands. Day after day they pour forth speech; night after night they display knowledge. There is no speech or language where their voice is not heard. Their voice goes out into all the earth, their words to the ends of the world."***

We are surrounded by God's miracles! Every animal is a miracle in itself. Think of these examples. The little one pound bird the Godwit flew 7,145 miles in 9 days without stopping at an average speed of 38.4mph! It made a round trip of 16,500 miles ending where it began without a map, compass, or a parent to guide it! Scientists have no answer for how it does it. The amazing cuttlefish which can change its colour to perfectly match its background even though it is colour blind. How do they do it? We have no idea! The brilliantly designed giraffe with its 20lb heart capable of pumping blood up to its brain 8ft higher, but still can maintain correct blood pressure when it lowers

its head to drink by a complicated valve system, the ability to run at 34mph and yet need only 30 minutes sleep a day! Wonderful!

But we don't have to travel to see miracles. They are all around us in our beautiful villages. The wonderful scenery, which can change according to the time of year – Winter, Spring, Summer and Autumn all bring amazing variations. Even the time of day brings changes – we had sunshine, hail, snow and rain all in the space of half an hour recently! What a wonderful world God has given us to live in! Let's enjoy it and praise the One who made it for us! On behalf of your Ministry Team may God bless us all.

LIFE WITH THE TRIBE - FEBRUARY 2016

February is an odd month with the meandering jet stream being blamed for the mild weather and the swing to very cold weather. I suppose that something has to be blamed.

Despite the still-long nights, some days feel quite Spring like and we can see buds beginning to burst into life everywhere; the elder appears to be most prolific. As we are playing in the garden one day, 'Gerald Durrell' asks if I can reach up to get a nest down from a tree. I haven't noticed it before but she has been watching it all winter. Having checked that it is highly unlikely that any bird ever returns to an old nest, other than to take material to build a new nest, I agree to do it. It is nestled snugly in between a couple of branches and as I pick it up, I can see how tiny and exquisite it is. It is only 6cm across and I'm pretty sure that it once belonged to a chaffinch. They make their nests from grass, moss and feathers bound with spider's webs and lined with feathers and wool, decorated with lichen and bark. The one we found even has horse hair woven into it. (I have a photo of it on my website.) Six million pairs nest here every year making the chaffinch the UK's second most common breeding bird. They are easily spotted with their dusky pink breast, grey-blue cap and when it flies, the white flash on their wings and tail feathers identifies them. We hope that they will find another nesting place this year.

At the bird feeder, a wide variety of birds return including several 'favourites'. The tiny long tailed tits arrive in an excited, chattering flock and perform impressive acrobatic feats hanging upside down on branches. Not to be outdone, the nuthatch returns to impress, as it descends the tree trunk head first, passing the equally extraordinary tree creeper who climbs directly up the trunk. The cock pheasant continues to visit at least twice a day and bizarrely appears to live alongside our cats and kittens. The kittens have made a rush for it a couple of times - the excitement of seeing something that impressive is just too tempting, but as the pheasant 'runs' away flapping its rich chestnut wings and calling its 'kok kok kok' sound, the kittens run back to the safety of the kitchen. The pheasant then returns to its feeding. We have a bird's eye(!) view of all this activity as we eat breakfast or lunch together and it is glorious, nature's living television - perfect for me to give a quick lesson in bird spotting too!

On the way back from dinner one evening, I find my first live frog of the year. It is sitting in the middle of the driveway. Just a common frog, but beautiful all the same; olive green with dark splotches all over it - as if the Littlest has had a go at painting some spots. Definitely a sign surely, that winter is past.

PARISH COUNCIL MATTERS – MARCH 2016

It is unfortunate that we often spend more time visiting places far afield rather than getting to know our own locality! I wonder how many of us in Abbots Ann are unfamiliar with at least some of its small acreage. If you don't take part in sports, walk dogs, ride horses, belong to organizations, or if you are busy at work all week, or frequently away on foreign trips, there may be no reason - or free time - to get to know the roads off your daily-beaten track.

For me, at least, the March meeting of the Parish Council at Burghclere Down Community Centre was a chance to see a part of the parish that I had not, in eight years of living here, had occasion to visit. The Centre facilities are welcoming, with helpful information leaflets and notice boards inside the entrance hall, and good parking. I hope the Council will schedule more meetings there in the coming months.

Cllr Beth Deacon (Chairman), and Cllr Susie Bleeker, were absent, but Vice-Chairman Cllr Elizabeth Howard controlled the meeting with calm firmness and efficiency so that all business was concluded pleasantly and well within the scheduled time.

Burghclere Down residents asked about progress on issues they had previously placed before the Council. It was revealed that the involvement of three separate builders in the original construction may have caused some strange anomalies. For instance, the running costs of one particular street light seemed to be the responsibility of a private resident. Neighbours felt it important for public safety that this light be maintained in working order. Hampshire County Councillor Andrew Gibson promised to investigate further, as provision of street lighting is normally under the County Council's aegis. Research of the original developers' plans may reveal who is responsible for what.

Andover Town Councillor Christopher Ecclestone was present at the meeting, having an interest in Burghclere Down through his involvement with the Andover town boundary review working party. At the end of March, Andover Town Council will be discussing a scheme which could eventually involve Burghclere Down becoming part of Andover rather than Abbots Ann. He emphasised that the parishes would have to agree to this.

The Parish Council warmly welcomed Bernard and Carol Readman as the new Footpaths Officers. They will be keeping an official eye on the state of the parish paths and will be able to notify the Parish Council of any problems. Residents of Burghclere Down present were pleased to hear of the new footpath running from the Garden Centre towards Andover. This permissive path, much-needed for pedestrian safety, has been granted to the Parish Council by the Family Burnfield, after a great deal of administrative and physical contribution from, among others, John and Julie Moon, and Ray Lucas.

The Parish Council has resolved to proceed with the "adoption" of the red telephone box in the village. The previous Council had applied to buy it from BT, having calculated they could scrape together the £1.00 purchase price, but BT had then changed its mind and decided to keep it for the time being. There is now another opportunity, and it is hoped this time all will go well. A Burghclere Down resident suggested using it for a book-exchange, and I am sure the Council would welcome other imaginative ideas...

The saga of the second village defibrillator may at last be drawing to a happy conclusion. Although it seems the British Heart Foundation scheme, diligently pursued by Cllr Susie Bleeker, may not now be bountifully-disposed to a community that already has a device within reach, the Parish Council does still have funds generously donated for the purpose by the previous permanent Clerk. These would have been used for a third defibrillator, had the British Heart Foundation application succeeded. The new Clerk is obtaining quotes for direct purchase and will select the cheapest package, so that the Poplar Farm Inn can install a device as soon as possible. Funding of further units for other parts of the parish, particularly Bulbery and Burghclere Down, will then be considered. Don't forget there is already one at The Eagle, in an illuminated white cabinet on the rear outside wall, ready for instant access and use.

Residents near The Green are reportedly concerned about what may or may not be planned for its use. The lease to the Parish Council from HCC includes provisions such as no buildings or allotments, but various other ideas have already been thrown into the hat, including planting an orchard and transferring the wildflower meadow. There are also those who want it just left as an open space! It was suggested a committee be established to manage The Green. This could not be resolved at the March meeting as the issue arose during "Public Participation" and was not an agenda item, but it will be discussed in April.

Did I not warn you of more committees to come?

Finally, your former Chairman, Cllr Bernard Griffiths, recently met senior engineers from Southern Water to discuss the continuing problem of water and sewage running down West Hill from an overflowing manhole near Manor Farm. They demonstrated the workings of the system, and explained that person or persons unknown have been opening manhole covers and adjusting the flow valves for their own purposes - overcoming Southern Water's padlocks in the process!

The valve operation is very sensitive; a small tweak can severely upset the balance of flow causing problems downstream. Engineers check and adjust the valve in Mill Lane every day to relieve any back-up from Monxton if necessary, without causing too fast a flow to the next pumping station. Long-term, only an imaginative engineering re-construction will solve this periodic flooding. Nothing is simple; even sealing the system from ground water

seepage during heavy rain would affect the water table and could itself cause flooding.

Checks and balances, recurring crises, self-interest - can our village sewers be a symbol of the State of the Nation?

UPDATE ON ST MARY'S CHURCH ABBOTTS ANN RESTORATION PROJECT

I am most pleased to be able to say that replacing the Nave, Chancel and Vestry roofs, plus masonry, brick work and drainage repairs were completed by the forecast completion date of 24 March 2016. Whilst the tidying up of the area around the church is still ongoing, because of the damage to both hard and grass surfaces being quite extensive, owing to the heavy work done in very wet weather, that too is going well.

I am most grateful for the efforts of G & J Banks, the main contractors, and of course to our Architect Duncan Wilson. The whole project ran very smoothly at a difficult time of year for the type of restoration work being carried out. My thanks also go to Chris Davis. Banks are based on the Isle of Wight. So to make the best use of time on site and save on traveling time they asked if we could find accommodation in the village for their workmen. On hearing this, Chris offered to put up three workmen on weekdays for the duration of the project. This proved to be a godsend. Thank you Chris and Margaret.

The new roofs can be seen from some angles, the clean black lines of the drainpipes clear and if you look closely new pieces of masonry and brickwork can also be seen. There is, however, much that is not obvious to the uninitiated and you could be forgiven for asking what did we get for The Heritage Lottery Fund's money (and that of our own St Mary's Building Trust). Rest assured, there was a lot of joinery work, now hidden under the new roofs, and much of the masonry and brickwork restoration cannot be seen clearly from ground level. There were in fact no fewer than one hundred and sixty sections where stones or bricks needed to be restored or replaced. Although we had some very wet weather, we were also lucky in that we had a very mild Winter. The use of lime mortar was essential and that will not cure in frosty conditions. In practice there were only a few days when restoration could not continue and any time lost was soon made up.

There are lots of photographs of the work and when the dust has settled we will explain in some detail what has been done. Suffice it to say that, thanks to the grants received and especially the support of the Heritage Lottery Fund, we hope that the exterior of St Mary's is in sufficiently good order to serve our Parish for another fifty years. In parallel with the restoration work we have been looking at ways of making our unique heritage more accessible. We are improving our web pages and the literature in the church and shop and will be holding a heritage exhibition; all aimed at attracting more support for St Mary's and investigating ways of how the church can be used better to serve our community.

All the hard work has not been just so that we have a nice church building in the centre of our village. We now need our parishioners to support the church and to welcome our new Priest-in-Charge. Without your support we will have



LOCAL HOUSING FOR LOCAL PEOPLE

In the week beginning April 11th the **Abbotts Ann Village Housing Survey** questionnaire will drop on your mat.

Why? Because two major concerns mentioned at the 2013 Abbotts Ann Vision community consultation were:

People who grow up in Abbotts Ann or have close family connections can't afford to live here

People who have lived in Abbotts Ann – perhaps for many years – want to down-size but can't find a smaller property in our village

The 2013 community consultation gave a snap-shot of what Abbotts Ann people want. Now the Parish Council in association with Abbotts Ann Vision would like to get a clearer picture of the housing needs of the village.

If the survey confirms the need and shows that villagers would support such development in principle, we would expect that no more than fifteen houses would be built: a small development for the village, controlled by the village. The survey would also provide information that would help to resist over-sized development proposals like the recent Richborough Estates application.
