Thank you so much for the welcome that we received on June 28th. Helen and I found the Benefice Service at St Peters profoundly moving. The patronal service for St Peters was also the opportunity to begin to think and pray towards the future. There is so much to be thankful for in each of the three parishes and I look forward to the journey ahead.

We had the opportunity to share in a lunch with all three PCCs and there was a commitment to work together towards the future. We visited some of the open gardens after lunch – thank you for the warmth of your welcome.

The Archdeacon of Bournemouth, Peter Rouch, will meet with the Church Wardens in September to begin the process of writing a benefice profile and to work towards the future. The Area Dean, John Harkin, is overseeing the provision of ministry in the vacancy. I hope to be with you over the Christmas period.

Whilst there is much to be thankful for, the next appointment of vicar will be critical not just to your Benefice, but also to the ministry of the Deanery and Diocese. Your Benefice has much to offer and I look forward to drawing on the wisdom and insights that you have. The Church Wardens have committed themselves to working together on the opportunities and challenges that lie ahead. This will include a review of services and provision of services at festivals.

One of the challenges that I need to ask you to look at as a Benefice is the contribution of Parish Share. In order to resource the mission of the Church this Diocese relies on the contributions of the parishes for over 80% of its income. Each Incumbent represents over £60,000pa in mission costs. I would be happy to receive an invitation to talk this through in detail with members of the Church and Community.

I have been to two services at All Saints, one at St Peter's and visited St Mary's. You have parish churches that are clearly places of prayer.

The three bishops have written a pastoral letter covering both ministry and

generosity. Can I commend the letter to you (particularly to be read alongside this one!)

discipleship of Jesus in this Diocese over the last year. What does that discipleship look like? It looks like the merchant in Jesus' parable – giving all that we are and all that we have to join in with the story and mission of God, the mission of the whole people of God. Over the next few months we want to explore with you how we *lead* and *sustain* the mission of the whole people of God as a 'community of missionary disciples' (Pope Francis), purposefully committed to contributing to the common good.

1. Leadership vocations ('Giving all that we are')

In September, Mark Collinson joins us (in collaboration with the Cathedral) as the first Canon Principal of the School of Mission. The School is entering a new phase of equipping and training the whole people of God for mission, as new opportunities are opened up by the national Church's 'Resourcing Ministerial Education' review. Everyone's calling is different, so the School is going to prepare and equip many kinds of disciples and leaders as part of our commitment to re-imagine the Church (our second strategic priority). Starting in September 2016 and over the next few years, the School will be extending its current activities to offer a range of modules, courses and programmes. Some of these could lead to recognition of a lay or an ordained vocation, whether as an evangelist, preacher, youth or families worker or worship leader, or as a local and contextually-trained licensed lay worker, licenced lay minister or self-supporting ordained minister.

How might the Holy Spirit be preparing you (or those you lead) to re-new or re-fresh your commitment to give all that you are? Where is the Spirit calling you to something new and unexpected? We are looking forward to conversations with you in the Autumn about how the School of Mission might help to test, equip and sustain those callings.

2. Generosity ('Giving all that we have')

The merchant in Jesus' story sold all that he had to buy the pearl of great price. Responding to the call of Jesus is costly as we follow the example of the one who emptied himself for our sakes (Philippians 2:7). Practising sacrificial living and exercising good stewardship are commitments we have made to each other in our fourth strategic priority, as part of our belonging together in Christ. We have worked hard over the last year to produce a system for our Common Mission Fund (our 'parish share') which better reflects our priorities and commitments, and to make a good transition to the new system as the starting point of our corporate generosity. This is only the start – it is by becoming *deeper disciples*, living lives of generosity – in fellowship, in life and in money – that we will enable effective leadership and the mission of the whole people of God. As the 'Resourcing the Future' review looks at how the national Church's resources can be most effectively used for mission, so in this Diocese we want to generate the resources we need to be a growing Church that makes a significant contribution to the common good.

Where, now, is the Holy Spirit calling us to be *radically* generous in our financial giving? Might he be calling us, together, to give all that the Common Mission Fund system asks of us, and even more? Does your Parish Mission Action Plan include an objective about stewardship and regular teaching on giving? You may like to know that our average giving has gone up, and is now £11.97 per week.

Bishop Jonathan and Bishop David are keen to visit Chapter meetings, Deanery Synods, clusters of parishes and worshipping communities from this Autumn to explore our responses to the call of God on our lives, particularly in these key areas of leadership vocations and of generosity. They will want to talk about the practical and detailed ways in which we are building them into our personal and corporate lives. Are they hard-wired into our Parish and Deanery Mission Action Plans? Are we planning for new responses to the call of Christ in these areas of our lives? How can we get ready for all that God has in store for us?

We continue to pray for you, rejoicing in our life together.

CLATFORD VALLEY GARDENING CLUB

Heavenly Hostas was the title of our June speaker, John Baker. There was a good turnout with most people wanting to know how to stop slugs and snails from devouring their beautiful leaves. John has the national collection of Hostas, the third biggest in England, and he is editor of the Hosta and Hemerocallis Society. Interestingly he bought his first Hosta at a car boot sale 25 years ago and now has 8000 altogether.

Hostas grow best in dappled shade although one or two can tolerate sun. They come in many colours and make good companion plants, for example under Acer trees. Some change colour seasonally. The thicker (rugose) leaved varieties such as 'Blueberry Waffle' are less likely to be eaten by slugs and snails.

Hostas can be grown successfully in pots or in the ground. The best time to buy a plant is in the spring although they can be divided in autumn and before the frosts come. They like rich soil such as farmyard manure and grit or bark chips provide good drainage. Make sure you give them lots of water and food at the beginning and end of the year. When planting, make a big hole to allow the roots to spread sideways and fill with potting compost. They will sleep for the first year but by the third year they will be well established.

Miniature Hostas never get any bigger and can look nice in troughs and containers. Blue Mouse Ears is very pretty with lovely blue flowers. There are 40 'Mouse Hostas' in total.

Pests and Diseases

Start on Valentine's Day by cleaning the garden by raking away old leaves and debris. This helps to get rid of eggs laid in October. There are many ways of managing pests. These include pellets which should only be applied thinly around the plant. Coffee grounds can be boiled twice and a solution made to water the plants. Epsom salts sprinkled on the soil form a barrier to repel pests and ashes and gravel can irritate. Some people use copper strips or a garlic solution where 2 garlic bulbs are crushed into 1 litre of water which is then boiled for 3-4 minutes. The white juice is sieved off and sprayed onto the plants. This makes the snails go away rather than kill them. Finally, 1 bottle of ammonia made into a solution with 9 bottles of water and sprayed onto the plant can also be effective. Why not try them all!

The way ahead is exciting and challenging, but your involvement is essential if St Mary's is to thrive once again. Your Parochial Church Council will have met twice to make plans for the future by the time you read this and we will be approaching you to clarify what is happening and to seek your ideas and involvement.

We need your prayers and active support to help the flame of Christ thrive in our Parish again.

84226 GUNNER CLIFTON HERBERT PITT CANADIAN FIELD ARTILLERY

Clifton Herbert Pitt and his twin brother, Chesney Louis, were born in 1879 and natives of Abbotts Ann. They were sons of Walter and Emma Pitt of Black Swan House, Duck Street, and part of a large family with an elder brother Hedley and 3 sisters. Clifton and Chesney both emigrated in the early part of the 20th century, Clifton to Canada and Chesney to Australia.

Clifton Herbert Pitt, a blacksmith who emigrated to Canada in the early 1900s, attested for service with the Canadian Overseas Expeditionary Force at Guelph, Ontario on 3rd February 1915 and was pronounced fit for military service the same day. As 84226 Gunner C H Pitt, he was posted to 16 Battery, 4 Brigade, Canadian Field Artillery, for employment as a shoeing smith, embarking for the United Kingdom on the SS Messanabie on 20th May and landing in Southampton on 30th May. He embarked for France on 14th September, arriving on 16th September. There are no records for 1916 but we must assume that he was regularly in action supporting the Canadian Corps.

Gunner Pitt was granted 10 days leave on 10th January 1917 and again 14 days on 22nd December which he spent in England. It is a reasonable assumption that he would have visited his mother Emma in Abbotts Ann. On 27th January he was charged with “being absent from the line of march while on active service from 9.00 am 25th January to 7.00 pm on 26th January”. For this offence he was stopped 2 days pay and sentenced to 14 days Field Punishment No 1. It appears that he did not learn from his punishment as he was charged with a similar offence of being absent from parade on 6th March for which he received 21 days field punishment.

Clifton Pitt was injured on 18th January 1918 with contusions to the face and knee when he tried to mount an artillery limber of 25 Battery whilst it was in motion; the wheel hit a stone and he fell off. He was initially hospitalised to 12 Canadian Field Ambulance at Fresnicourt and then to 46 Field Ambulance until he rejoined his unit on 31st January. Because the medical authorities had been told to report all potentially self inflicted wounds for possible Court Martial, a board of inquiry into the circumstances of the injury was raised by Capt W E Sinclair Canadian Army Medical Corps. On 18th January, Pitt's Commanding Officer decided that the injury was caused by an accident, rather than being a deliberate act; this recommendation being supported by the Brigade Commander on 19th February and by the General Officer Commanding 2 Canadian Division on 20 February. Pitt was again injured by a gunshot wound to his left leg at Monchy on 4th September, which was sufficiently serious for him to be evacuated via 45 Casualty Clearing Station at Bailleulval to 3 Australian General Hospital at Abbeville and thence to the Middlesex War Hospital, St Albans, where he was admitted on 9th September.

Gunner Pitt's wound, as described on the Medical Case Sheet, was severe and he was transferred to the Canadian Hospital, Epsom on 25th January 1919 and

LIFE WITH THE TRIBE - JUNE 2015

Summer madness is on us as the month whizzes by in a blur of end of year exams, tennis matches, netball, hikes, sailing, cricket, fêtes and sports days. The Tribe's 3 cats however, have taken up a more sedentary life. They no longer spend the nights prowling in the darkness and we are no longer tripping over the remains of freshly caught rabbit as we dash out in the morning. Instead, the cats curl up at the end of each of their owner's beds and together they sleep all night. Most bizarre. But we think we may know why. We have seen a rather handsome fox appearing in daylight hours along Cattle Lane and in the field behind us. We assume that both the fox and cats have been hunting the same prey and perhaps the cats came a little too close and had a bit of a scare. Back in 2005, hungry foxes were attacking domestic cats and vets were seeing more injuries, but this is pretty unusual and I haven't seen any mention of it in the press. Who knows for sure why they have been inside, but the Tribe are enjoying their company at night again.

After the excitement of the elephant hawk moth's appearance last month, this month, the Littlest successfully 'rears' 5 painted lady butterflies. From 'hungry caterpillar' eating non-stop (just like in Eric Carle's story) to more than double in size. What actually happens is miraculous; they outgrow their skin and a hormone is released instructing the larva to moult, which it does several times. It then stops feeding and hangs upside down where it spins a cocoon around itself. More hormones are involved and the cells in the larva basically self destruct to release the 'butterfly making material'. Rapid cell division follows the end result being: a butterfly. Amazing. There is an astonishing video shot by scientists at the Natural History Museum using high tech imaging (search 3-D imaging of a butterfly chrysalis). Occasionally as we watch the chrysalides, they start to shake quite violently; this is a natural instinct to ward off predators. Gradually, one by one, our butterflies emerge from their chrysalides. As they do so they dry their wings and force liquid under pressure, into the veins of the wings. Once the wings are formed, red liquid (meconium), is expelled - it looks just like blood and we are all totally fascinated. The two halves of the proboscis is also joined together at this time. The Tribe find wild flowers and different fruits for the butterflies. A week later, on a warm, still evening, they are set free and we watch them flutter across the meadow. They are migrating butterflies and can fly thousands of kilometres to find food. I wonder where they will end up.

As well as the 'birth' of our butterflies, we also find a blackbird's nest in a pyracantha clinging to the house. We watch the mother sitting on what we assume is a clutch of eggs and the Tribe are utterly delighted when they find a nest full of totally helpless, naked chicks. At this point the parents are incredibly busy flying to and from the nest with a constant supply of food for their young. Space in the nest gets tighter and tighter as the chicks grow and

thence to 16 Canadian General Hospital, Orpington on 27th June for a protracted course of treatment caused by wound complications. On 28th March he was granted permission to marry. He was subject to a Medical Board at Orpington on 8th July. The Board's opinion was that he should return to Canada and could not practise his original trade of blacksmith. On 14th August he was struck off strength at the Canadian Forces Discharge Depot at Buxton and returned to Canada.

Clifton Pitt died in Canada on 7th July 1939. His service to his birth country is commemorated on the memorial panel inside the War Memorial Hall, Abbotts Ann, although he is erroneously shown as serving in the Canadian Light Infantry. He was entitled to the British War and Allied Victory Medals.

SCHOOL GOVERNOR VACANCIES

Abbotts Ann Church of England Primary School currently has two vacancies for community governors to join the school's governing body. A community governor is representative of the interests of the local community within which the school operates.

What does being a governor involve?

First and foremost, governors need to be passionate and engaged about the education and wellbeing of children at the school. We have six full governing body meetings per year (one per half term), held in the evening. Every governor is also a member of a sub-committee (either Finance and Resources, or School Improvement) which meet approximately five times per year, usually during the school day. At these meetings, governors oversee the performance of the school through: feedback from the staff; reviewing data; and any personal insights from visiting the school. The governors then collectively make decisions about the school.

Governors also visit the school during the day at least once but preferably twice per term to look at a particular aspect of how the school runs. Finally, all governors have the opportunity to learn about different aspects of school governance through signing up to relevant training courses (provided by Hampshire County Council under a subscription service with the school).

What sort of people do we need?

We are all different and we encourage diversity in the governing body by seeking people from all backgrounds, and experiences. However, all governors should be able to conduct themselves professionally, discreetly and diplomatically; be good at working as part of a team; and have a respect for, but not be afraid to challenge, the status quo. Governors are often viewed as "critical friends" to the school. Appointment is subject to completion of satisfactory 'disclosure and barring' background checks (formerly known as CRB).

Why should I join?

Through the commitment you give as a governor, it is very rewarding to feel part of the strategic management and oversight of the school, and to become a familiar face to the children and staff. Often one of the most pleasing aspects of the role is speaking to the children about the work they are doing, and their understanding of key topic areas such as "keep safe" messages and spirituality.

This was Hampshire Federation's main centenary event and it was a glorious summer's evening, so we were able to enjoy our picnics, indulge in a (free) cupcake at the interval and then enjoy a spectacular firework display at the end.

For our own June Meeting we visited the Lavender Fields at Hartley Park Farm near Alton. We were greeted by our host, Tim Butler, the third generation at Hartley Park Farm, which is a family affair as Tim runs the farm with his wife Anne and son.

English Lavender was introduced to the farm ten years ago and four main varieties are grown; Folgate and Maillette, which produce essential lavender oil, Grosso which produces lavandin oil and Imperial Gem used for dried seed production and bunching. This high quality essential lavender is used to develop perfumed hand, body and home fragrance products, which are all made in England. They also grow a number of other English lavenders such as Hidcote and Edelweiss and it takes three years for the lavender plants to mature with a life-cycle of between 7 to 10 years.

The lavender is harvested in the early mornings during July and August and is taken immediately to the distillery on site. Lavender oil is like fine malt whisky as it is left to mature for several years! Tim was a very enthusiastic host and regaled us with many humorous stories - some involving past employees, one of which was found asleep on the tractor one morning after a late night down the local pub(?)! The afternoon finished with a delicious cream tea and a visit to the on-site shop and members were seen heading home

with hand creams, teas, biscuits and, of course, lavender plants.

No meeting this month, so yes you may get lucky next month with a much shorter report!

However, we are off to Waddesdon Manor on 13th August which is a National Trust property. If anyone would like to join us please give me a ring on 01264 335630 as we still have room on the coach.
