1918 . On 2nd September 1918 he was re-boarded in medical category B1 and on 28th September 1918 he attended a signalling course at Alexandria and was granted proficiency pay at Class 1 on 10th October 1918 as a signaller. He then remained as an instructor at the Signals Base Depot until 6th January 1919. On 19th January 1919 he moved to 2 Demobilisation Camp and embarked on TS Bermudian at Port Said on 12th February 1919. On 28th February 1919 he was demobilised at Dover to the Class Z Army Reserve and dispersed to civilian life from 1 Dispersal Unit at Fovant on 1st March 1919.

There is a folio on the AF B104 where it appears that, on 22nd December 1919, the TF asks for a notification to the effect that Earney was not insured whilst in the army. This is possibly to do with the issue of a partial disability pension.

On his discharge in 1919, Signaller Hubert John Earney was noted as an exemplary soldier who was reliable and intelligent. He was entitled to the British War and Victory Medals.

Hubert John Earney died in 1962 aged 72 years.

301758 SIGNALLER HUBERT JOHN EARNEY ROYAL GARRISON ARTILLERY



Hubert John Earney was born in Abbots Ann, near Andover in Hampshire in 1889, the son of Hubert, a domestic gardener, and Anne. The youngest of four children, he had two sisters, Eva and Lydia, and a brother Albert Frank. In the 1901 Census, he is now styled as John and is presumably at school. In 1911 he is shown as a boarder at the Medecroft College of Science in Sparkford Road, Winchester, where he was a student.

He married Ethel Mary Payne on 25th April 1916 at Moordowne near Christchurch and they lived in Abbots Ann, Andover, Hants. Earney is shown as a schoolmaster on his military enrolment documentation.

Earney was called up on 27th October 1916 and was attested into the Special Reserve on 1st November 1916 at Winchester with a Medical Category A – fit for general service. He declared previous service of 2 years in 4th Bn Hampshire Regiment TF and it would appear that he was to be put into the Hampshire Regiment, having had previous infantry experience, in spite of not having perfect vision. However, he expressed a preference of the Royal Garrison Artillery (RGA) and was posted as 301758 Gunner Earney to No 3 Depot RGA at the Citadel, Plymouth, on 13th November 1916. He completed his gunnery training at No 3 Depot on 14th April 1917 and was posted to 10 Mountain Battery RGA. On 23rd August 1917 he embarked at Southampton for Alexandria, landing on 12th September 1917 to become part of the Egyptian Expeditionary Force.

On 8th December 1917, he sustained a gunshot wound to the scalp and was admitted to 70 General Hospital. On 21st January 1918 he was boarded to Medical Category B1 – fit for service abroad in Garrison or Provisional units and on 28th January 1918 he joined 9 Base Depot and subsequently 103 Company RGA where he was re-designated as a Signaller on 28th August

CLATFORD VALLEY GARDENING CLUB

What an entertaining evening we had in June when Kate Bennett and Eleanor Waterhouse came to give us an insight into how they became involved in the television production of The Big Allotment Challenge last year, becoming runners up after competing against nine other couples.

How it all began

Eleanor had a friend who saw a flyer at the Winchester Farmers' Market advertising for people with experience of growing and cooking to enter. A form was filled in and to their great surprise a telephone call invited them to London for an interview and screen test. The screen test involved a flower arrangement which was very successful and so they went through to the next round.

The BBC decided to make a programme which would include: flowers, fruit and vegetables and it was hoped it would encourage viewers to take up an allotment. The presenter was Fern Britten and there were three judges. What the ladies found interesting was just how little the producers actually knew about gardening themselves.

There were many challenges throughout the series but they kept changing which made things tricky at times. Fruit growing proved difficult as it didn't always ripen to order. The BBC employed a 'garden expert' to show the viewer how to grow the perfect veg but she didn't appear on the programme which suggested the programme wasn't about teaching people how to grow successfully, but more about competition. Filming was constant starting at 7am and even involved being filmed at home for a day although only 30 seconds of it was actually shown on TV.

What did they learn from the experience?

Sarah Raven is to be avoided. SB Plant Invigorator kills bugs and feeds plants and is obtainable from Amazon. Tomorite is a magic product and should be used twice a week to feed plants during the growing season. Labelling is important.

Why did they do so well?

They looked carefully at the criteria and studied the rules in detail. They were used to working together and got on well. They had lots of luck but also visited the plot regularly to make sure everything was on track. They were very relaxed and amusing and engaged well with the members. Everyone learned a lot and thoroughly enjoyed the talk.

August will bring another annual show so please make sure you enter and have some fun.

The speaker at the next meeting will be Geoff Hawkins and he will be talking about 'Garden Design' which should be very interesting so please come along and join us on 24th August where you will be sure of a warm welcome.

VIEW FROM THE REAR STALLS

After the recent carnage on the Parish Council, the remaining two members met on 29th June to cover essential business. The annual return had to be approved for the auditors, the statutory deadline being 30th June. A Chairman had to be chosen, to comply with legislation. There were also invoices to be paid, which can only be authorised in an officially summoned meeting.

The minimum number of members who must be present to constitute a valid meeting (the "quorum") is three. With only two elected councillors remaining in post, the council was incapable of operating - as a functioning body, it was moribund. The Clerk, normally the administrator of council business, cannot take charge. Although termed the "Proper Officer", he or she is nevertheless an employee, and can properly only act under instruction from the employer, the council. The Clerk is not even allowed to sign cheques. It was therefore vital to have a quorate council meeting as soon as possible so that the body could be revived and start to make legally-binding decisions.

TVBC, as the supervisory authority, resolved at their own full meeting to appoint the Anna Ward Borough Councillors, Maureen Flood and Graham Stallard, as temporary Parish Councillors. There were therefore technically four members present at the meeting of 29th June and business could resume. Cllr Stallard was at pains to emphasise that anything contentious would be left for newly-elected councillors to discuss: Cllr Flood and he would only contribute to facilitating the immediate business.

Neither Borough Councillor thought it appropriate to be Chairman so Cllr Andrew Hayter was duly voted to the chair. He made it clear that this was only for the present meeting. Business was quickly completed - the audit return approved, and cheques authorised for payment.

The date of the next meeting was to depend on the number of people standing for election to the council: if there were more candidates than seats, there would be a ballot on 4th August; if fewer, those standing would automatically be "elected" and a further meeting would need to be called to consider possible co-option to any vacant seats.

As it has transpired, the number of candidates exactly matched the vacancies and no ballot was needed.

Tim Abram, Mike Doherty, Lorna Hague, Colin Teasdale and Dale Wells had submitted their names for election by the close of nominations on Friday, 8th July. They will now automatically be our new Parish Councillors and I am sure we all wish them well in their efforts to look after and promote the interests of all who live within the parish boundaries. All vacancies are filled and there is no need for co-option (that is, existing councillors selecting people they think suitable to join them).

The next Parish Council meeting is expected to take place on 16th August, although final confirmation will be when the agenda is posted on the

It was a literal breath of fresh air from all this politicking to take part in a farm walk organised by Abbots Ann Countryside Group!

Matthew Read very generously gave up an evening to guide a dozen or so people to different locations on his farm. He explained his modern system of crop production, and how nowadays thousands of acres can be managed with minimal manpower thanks to technology. He showed us some extremely impressive and huge machinery that seems almost - not quite - to need no human input. I wondered what my late father would have made of it all, having grown up in the 'twenties when horses ploughed the furrows!

It was interesting to hear of the number of hares that are seen in Matthew's fields, as well as other wildlife. Modern attitudes in farming seem more in tune with nature than in previous years - the EU gives financial incentives to landowners to leave uncultivated strips and hedgerows, for instance.

Pimms and burgers in the barn concluded a very pleasant and informative evening. Thank you very much to Matthew and Jenny for their hospitality, and for giving us an insight into the business aspects of the beautiful English countryside.

There are uncertainties ahead for farming, as for all of us at this time. The country has faced a period of conflicting personalities and ideology, lots of resignations, a new cabinet, a new leader, and is looking forward to a new direction.

Dare one say that, in this national experience, once again, Abbots Ann has led the way!
