We get a lot of calls, asking for advice, from people whose cats are toileting in inappropriate places. There is often a simple reason for this. If the cat refuses to go out it may be because there is an aggressive cat in the vicinity. If this is the case providing an indoor litter tray may well solve the problem. Litter trays should be placed somewhere quiet and private, well away from windows and outside doors. If you have more than one cat the rule is one tray per cat plus an extra one.

VOLUNTEER TREASURER NEEDED FOR OUR VILLAGE PRE-SCHOOL



Abbotts Ann Nursery School, based in the War Memorial Hall, is a registered charity which is managed by a committee of volunteers, who are elected every September at our AGM.

ABBOTTS ANN PARISH COUNCIL CHAIRMAN'S REPORT AS PRESENTED AT THE ANNUAL PARISH ASSEMBLY ON 14TH MAY 2015

I would like to start by thanking all the parishioners of Abbotts Ann who took the trouble to turn out on 7th May to vote in the three elections. The new parish councillors can only be grateful for the strong show of support and we will all do our duty to work for the good of the parish, to maintain – and improve where necessary – the quality of life for those who live in it.

Thank you also to all who spent so much time publicising the parish council election, and all those who had the courage to put their names forward for nomination. In the recent past, although councillors are re-elected every four years, there have not been sufficient candidates to necessitate a public vote – if only seven people offer themselves for seven places, there is no need for a poll. It is certainly not true that there has been "no election" for 20 years, but the criticism emphasises that the council must in future go to greater lengths to advertise elections, beyond what is required by law.

Never have so many new councillors been elected at one time to this council. There will be a learning curve for all of us, and much professional training required. A parish council, however humble and few its powers, has to follow the laws of the land with regard to procedures. It is not a glorified committee, but a layer of local government.

It is my earnest hope that, now a clear, democratic decision has been taken, your council will be able to move forward as a united body – no doubt with different ideas and aims, but certainly with the underlying intention of supporting and enabling the wishes and aspirations of all the residents of this parish. I welcome the support, energy and expertise that the new councillors will surely bring to their new role.

The past year has had its administrative difficulties on the council. We were sorry to lose Adrian Stokes as clerk. He had served the parish loyally and diligently for nine years, besides having served a previous term in the post. We were very pleased to welcome Arthur Peters in his place, and the work he undertook was enormous. The hours and effort that he expended on behalf of the parish were much appreciated by the council and villagers alike. His efficiency and attention to detail were exemplary. We were sorry to have to accept his resignation at the end of April.

Since then, the council has been looked after by our locum clerk, Mrs Amy Taylor, who is a qualified parish clerk and has long experience in the law and procedure of parish councils. We have been delighted with the manner in which she has dealt with the statutory requirements of the council at what is the busiest time of year, and at very short notice. We will be advertising for a permanent clerk once the pay and conditions have been agreed.

I would like to express my personal thanks to the councillors who did not stand at this election, and who have given this village many years of solid, and devoted, service. They have given their free time, as will the new councillors, to deliberating on decisions that in some cases affect only individuals, in other cases affect the whole parish. I thank them for their unfailing support, despite differences of opinion over the years, and their loyalty: Penny Wilkins, Graham Whyte (former vice-chairman), David Paffett, Stan Oram, and Rebecca Bone. Thank you, too, to Brian Sims, for standing and continuing to serve on the new council.

I would also like to thank all of you for all the support, encouragement, and useful criticism you have offered in the past year, and for your interest in the affairs of the parish and the parish council.

So, what else has been happening in the parish this year?

A lease was signed by the parish council and Hampshire County Council, giving the parish council management over the former **Manor Close Playing Field** for 99 years. The negotiations had begun following a meeting with Graham Whyte, Adrian Stokes, and the then leader of HCC. It was subsequently evident that there was potential for village open spaces to be protected under a legal "Village Green" status. Dale Wells led a very successful campaign to push for the field to be designated as such, but HCC did not wish to give up their ownership of the land. They therefore agreed a 99 year lease with the parish council, under certain conditions (eg. no buildings, no commercial use, and no allotments) at the exorbitant rent of £1 per annum.

The parish council has sought ideas from villagers for the use of the field, remembering that the purpose of acquiring it was to ensure the preservation of an open space for the use of all villagers. The new parish council will be working with the village to fulfil these ideas.

ABBOTTS ANN NEW GENERATION ARTISTS' POP CONCERT

Abbotts Ann New Generation Artists, youngsters mostly from the village or nearby, gave a concert in aid of St Mary's Church on Friday, 22nd May. The quality of the music and the singing was exciting! Abbotts Ann has talent – of professional ability. An audience of about 60 responded with enthusiasm and the evening turned into a 'Pop' party. Congratulations to Matthew Carter who organised the boys and to Malin Russell, who produced the girls and thanks to all those who performed, Daisy Wigg, Neha Panchmets, Matthew Carter, Hugh Riley-Smith and Patrick Smith.

The concert raised £560 - for the Church.

CLATFORD VALLEY GARDENING CLUB

John Negus, who has visited us many times before, gave a lively talk on "Shrubs of Distinction" at the May meeting of the club. Members of the audience were first asked to describe a shrub of their own of which they were particularly fond, and then he continued by recommending different shrub varieties and their care. He illustrated his talk with some lovely slides and amusing comments. Some of the ones he recommended were *Abutilon* Tennants White, *Corylopsis sinensis* and *Azara serrata*, although the latter one is not fully hardy and needs a sheltered spot in the garden. Throughout the talk one of the points he emphasised was the need to feed shrubs after they have been pruned with something organic such as blood, fish and bone. At the end there was a light-hearted quiz, the prizes won were various garden products and packets of seeds. There was then enough time left for questions.

Earlier in the evening, the chairman gave a brief report on the evening visit to Dean House at Kilmeston, which everyone who went, agreed that it was a lovely garden and would be well worth another visit later in the year (it is in the Yellow Book). Members were also reminded about two club events coming up, the Barbecue on 12th July, and the visit to Hidcote on 21st July.

The **War Memorial Hall playpark** passed its RoSPA safety inspection, with praise for the work of the constructor, Adam Rose. We must thank the then clerk, Arthur Peters, for his unstinting efforts and determination in ensuring a safe and enjoyable environment for children, and Rebecca Bone for her efforts in establishing the play area in the first place.

On **highways matters**, the council has continued to press for speed restrictions in the village. Cllr Andrew Gibson of HCC advised that the county council's budget was very limited, but that after their initial trials, it might be possible for Abbotts Ann to be included in a speed check survey. St John's Cross is a perpetual problem; it is not good enough for the authorities to say it is not a high priority danger area because there have not been enough serious accidents. We have been informed that Burghclere Down's 20 mph limit appears not to be working, and there are still issues of bad parking there. Following information from walkers along Dunkirt Lane, we have been able to arrange a **dog bin** from TVBC, and are arranging for more elsewhere.

I was pleased to see that prospective councillors were keen to promote links with **Burghclere Down** and to try to make the residents feel more included in the parish activities. 

Abbotts Ann Green Action has worked hard over the year to encourage more environmentally-friendly thinking in the community, including the offer of a thermal imaging survey of houses to discover sources of heat loss.

Last year saw a magnificent series of displays about the effects of the First World War on the village and villagers. A phenomenal amount of information was gathered by a dedicated and enthusiastic group, led by the **Village Archivist**, Tim Tayler, shedding light on not just the horrors of the fighting itself, but on the day to day lives of the real people who lived and worked in this village at the time, many of them in houses we live in to-day. It brought them back to life in a special way. One photograph was particularly poignant – through computer art, it superimposed a ghostly figure from the past on a modern view of one of the village houses. It reminded me very much that those who have gone before are not that far away, and maybe we should pay heed to what they might be thinking of how we develop and change the village that was their physical home once upon a time.

The **WI** has always been a backbone of village life, and we thank all those involved in the work of the movement; in providing informative and interesting meetings that we read about in the parish magazine, and in always being ready to support village events with refreshments and good humour.

The **Fete Committee** worked hard, as every year, to give us another excellent village function last autumn. The village fete is an institution that perhaps we tend to take for granted, but to provide all the stalls, games, food, entertainment and general traditional village fun takes much time and effort, with long hours meeting to decide what is needed; the contacting of numerous outside organisations; and the physical task of actually setting up all the marquees, tables, show rings and so on.

WATER MEADOW WILDLIFE REPORT - SLOW-WORMS

Despite their name, Slow-worms are, of course, not worms but legless lizards; but like worms they are not poisonous in any way and they certainly move more slowly than lizards. They can occasionally be seen in the drier areas of the water meadows and also in some local gardens*, but unfortunately not ours. Their superficial resemblance to snakes means that many are unnecessarily killed which is a pity since they are really useful in the garden. Their inability to move very quickly means that their prey also has to be slowish, so slugs and snails are their snack of choice and they tend to come out at night, or after rain, when the slugs and snails are most active.

Slow-worms belong to the class of animals that are relatively slow breeders but live a long time; they don't start breeding until they are several years old

but are believed to live up to 30 years in the wild and one lived 54 years in captivity. If you are lucky enough to have them in your garden then you can encourage their breeding by leaving some piles of rotting vegetation or having a compost heap, and lengthen their life by refraining from using slug pellets containing Metaldehyde or Methiocarb which not only poisons slugs but also anything that then eats them. Slug pellets containing Aluminium Sulphate, which affect the slime-producing glands of slugs, do not have this knock-on effect and beer traps are an even more eco-friendly option. But with a bit of luck your friendly slow-worms will keep the slugs in check by themselves.

LIFE WITH THE TRIBE - MAY 2015

Despite having more rain this month than in previous Mays and the weather being a little unpredictable, the natural world around us has delivered plenty of interest and even a little excitement!

Early in the month we notice that the field is absolutely covered in dandelion clocks. We have somehow missed them as bright yellow flowers, or perhaps it's just that a field with dozens of white, fluffy, pompom heads sitting amongst the grasses is more unusual. Maybe it's the relatively mild weather that we've had together with plenty of watering from the heavens, that has encouraged the high numbers this year - and we have not topped the field so the flowers have been able to seed. This however, I discover, is a good thing. The flower is made of as many as 100 florets all filled with pollen, perfect for bugs, bees and butterflies. Small birds such as sparrows and finches will eat the seed. And of course small children tell the time by blowing the seeds, although with the Littlest we have made it up to 'thirty o'clock', so it's perhaps not the most accurate way of telling the time! The sight of so many dandelion clocks initially filled me with horror, but having discovered how beneficial they are to nature, I am happy that the tractor has stayed away and will see their return in a more positive light.

Later in May the Tribe are discussing the fact that the field has 'turned purple'. I am wondering what on earth they're talking about, but when I go to look from an upstairs window, they are indeed right. The field looks purple! Gerald Durrell picks one of the grasses and finds that it is meadow foxtail, a common, early flowering grass. Its head is a soft cylindrical spike that turns purple as it flowers. Soon bright yellow buttercups and sunny ox-eye daisies begin to appear amidst the sea of purple. The hedgerows become increasingly white as the hawthorn joins the blackthorn in bloom and swathes of wild garlic appear with their bright green leaves and delicate white flowers.

In our garden a new bird appears - a pied wagtail. It is small and doesn't stop moving; it reminds me of members of my Tribe. It is easily recognisable as it lives up to its name 'wagtail' - it does just that, moving its tail up and down all the time. Its black and white feathers are also easy to spot. Apparently in Italy they are called ballerinas which is quite fitting and rather romantic. A happy little bird that I hope will stay.

Back in September last year, the Boy found a slightly scary looking elephant hawk moth caterpillar that Gerald Durrell subsequently kept in a small box. Since then the box has lived primarily on top of the recycling bins in the conservatory (although it was brought into the laundry when the temperatures dropped over the winter). I was pretty convinced that nothing would happen and we would be cleaning out another dead occupant (I failed to raise a couple of African land snails). But no! Noticing a pile of earth on top of the bins, I moved the box to clean it and there it was, in all its striking, fuchsia splendour - a brand new elephant hawk moth!

Fortunately I am not alone in my immense excitement at the moth's arrival - all the Tribe have been thrilled and amazed at its survival! The Littlest has taken the box into Nursery to show her teachers and friends and she now probably knows more about elephant hawk moths than other four year olds! We keep the moth in the box for a few days with fresh grasses and flowers, until there is a dry evening for us to release it outside. Our feline friends however, have other ideas. Coming down into the kitchen one night, I find three completely over excited cats running around with an upturned box on the floor. I can only surmise that the moth started fluttering in the darkness and the cats jumped on the box in an attempt to 'play' with the moth. We never find any sign of the moth again - hopefully it flew away somewhere. Unfortunately I have a horrible feeling that it ended up as a late night snack for one of the cats. I hope that we have more success with our butterflies.
