Dear Friends

When I was a teenager, there was a game we used to play called 'In the manner of the word' (I have also heard it called 'In the manner of the adverb'). It's a game in the same sort of vein as Charades, in that people have to act out something and others have to guess something from their actions.

How it works: Person A goes out of the room and those remaining choose an adverb that Person A is going to have to guess on their return. Person A returns to the room, not knowing what the adverb is and selects one or two people to act out a scenario, in the manner of the (unknown) adverb.

For example the unknown adverb might be 'lovingly' or 'impatiently' or 'hungrily'. Person A says something like 'I want you to act out playing a game of cricket', in the manner of the adverb! So, the chosen actors perform playing cricket lovingly or impatiently or hungrily, and Person A tries to guess the adverb. This usually results in some hilarity as group members act out the scenarios and individuals struggle to guess the adverbs.

Wednesday 1st March, is the start of Lent. A time when people traditionally give something up, fast or choose to live more abstinely, following the example of Jesus' 40 days without food in The Wilderness and the three-fold temptations of The Devil. The temptations are all related to **HOW** Jesus is going to live his life and fulfil his mission. Is he going to be driven by other people's expectations? Is he going to achieve his ends by force? Is he corruptible in his ideals? Of course not! He is going to be faithful to God, while being compassionate to the need he sees around him; he is going to be a man of peace in the midst of a people desperate for freedom from oppression and he is going to be an example of a life lived in service to his heavenly Father.

Whatever we do in our lives - whether we go out to earn a living or work from home, care for family and neighbours or take part in different leisure activities – **HOW** do we live? What are we known for? Perhaps Lent is a time for us to consider what we want to be known for, remembered for and to work out what that means for us.

The churches in the benefice are offering a Lent course with weekly sessions looking at how Christian faith effects the way we live our lives, on our Frontline - our Frontline being the place where we spend much of our time; the place God has put us and called us be. A place of possibility and potential. What might God want to do where we are day by day? How might he use us? How will we grow?

Groups will meet Tuesday evenings 7.30pm in Goodworth Clatford, Wednesday mornings 10.30am in Abbotts Ann and Thursday afternoons 3pm in Upper Clatford. If you would like to know more please contact me or another member of the ministry team – contact details in The Directory section of this magazine.

Sunday 26th March is Mothering Sunday and each church in the benefice will have a special 10am service for all generations to worship together. You are most welcome to join us for one of these or any of our services. Full details in this magazine.

Final word – please note a change of service time at St Mary's, Abbotts Ann on the second Sunday of each month – the communion service will now be at 10am rather than 9.30am.

Dahlias

Dahlias should be divided every 2-3 years if left in the ground. Always put on a good mulch over winter. They can also rot in heavy soil.

Now is a good time to set them up. Put compost in a tray and put the tubers on top. Give them a misting. Once shoots appear you can take basal cuttings. Tubers can be divided as long as there is a shoot attached to the tuber. Keep moist but not too wet.

Start them in a frost free place. Light isn't necessary but heat can be applied later. Always remember to rehydrate.

Snowdrops should be divided when they have leaves but after flowering (in the green).

VIEW FROM THE REAR STALLS

I'm sure many people enjoy watching 'Spooks'. There's nothing like a good behind-the-scenes spy story to make you wonder what's happening in reality!

Much administration and negotiation in government or commerce must necessarily take place in confidence, so that the opposition doesn't know the full extent of one's strategy or armoury. The public is only told what it needs to be told. As the slogan says, 'I'm a mushroom – they keep me in the dark and feed me rubbish!' This can lead to misunderstandings of how decisions have been made, but the more important consideration is that the decisions have been able to be made at all.

So it is also with local affairs. It's the telephone calls between people who know each other that often make the real progress, by-passing the 'box-ticking'. Sometimes, this is not even documented, and things 'just happen'. Unfortunately, this can lead to the general populace thinking no action has been taken, or that some other catalyst has brought about the result achieved. Indeed, sometimes not even members of the organisations know exactly what has gone on in private – especially if they don't research their facts - and may pat themselves on the back for achieving something that was not, in fact, their doing. Those who have actually enabled the progress cannot always be recognised, but that is the nature of public service: the 'result' is all that matters. Discretion and confidentiality are the means to it, not self-aggrandisement.

Parish council (PC) meetings are 'meetings held in public,' not 'public meetings.' The public can only watch proceedings, unless invited to speak by the Chairman. However, because the public is present, councillors have to be diplomatic in the information they divulge. So, for example, when discussing contracts, they retire in closed session, to keep sensitive commercial or personal information private. The Local Government Act permits this in certain strict circumstances only - otherwise councillors could cheerfully discuss everything amongst themselves behind closed doors in a smoke-filled room, and there would be no transparency for their electors.

The public is entitled to see documents produced to aid councillors at or before meetings held in public - otherwise the discussions are meaningless to those who want to see democracy in action, and are not transparent. Formerly, such documents were attached to the minutes in the village shop for all to read. This appears to be no longer the

CLATFORD VALLEY GARDENING CLUB

Our speaker in January was Sally Burr and her talk was about 'Propagation'. Sally has been a volunteer at The Vyne National Trust property for 20 years and as well as having an RHS diploma, she also tends the garden at Winchester City Mill and Sandham Memorial.

Sally stressed how important it is to repot and top dress plants and remove any dead foliage to keep them healthy, especially if you hope to take cuttings from them. When you do decide to propagate plants, you must make sure your tools are clean and sharp and pots are washed. Antiseptic wipes are good for this.

Sowing Techniques

Firstly, don't sow too many seeds. Any surplus can be kept in the fridge or a cool and dry place. Naturally germination will diminish with time. Choose good multi-purpose compost and mix half and half with Vermiculite fine grade. Fine seed such as lobelia can be mixed with silver sand or Vermiculite which makes it easier to sow. You can water the compost first or water afterwards from below. Always remember to label and date your seeds. Bigger seeds shouldn't be sown too thickly. Seeds that sink are viable, seeds that float are not. Sow them individually and if they have a hard coating nick the coating or soak them in water. A mini propagator can be made using transparent fruit containers. Once they have germinated move them to a warmer place.

Cuttings

Make sure your stock plant is healthy and free of pests and diseases. Soft cuttings can be taken from March onwards, semi-ripe cuttings in the middle of summer and hardwood cuttings are taken once growth has ripened and the leaves have fallen off. Winter is a good time to take fruit cuttings such as gooseberry or blackcurrant and also rose, viburnum and cotinus. Take a piece about the thickness of a pencil. Cut the top at a slant and the bottom straight so you don't plant it upside down. Several cuttings can be planted around the edge of the pot and kept outside.

Soft cuttings should be cut below a node, removing several lower leaves.

Root cuttings should be buried well in the compost leaving only a little bit showing. Root cuttings from plants such as primula or pulmonaria are put in horizontally and covered with compost.

Division

Sally went on to remind us that some herbaceous plants need to be divided every 2, 3 or 4 years when the centre of the plant has died. This will re-invigorate the plant and improve your stock. A couple of garden forks back to back should do the trick.

If the plant flowers in June, divide in autumn and if it flowers in summer onwards, divide in spring.

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practice, possibly to save space in the minutes folder. Nevertheless, these are public documents, and as the bare minutes can be a little obscure without background information, they should be available from the Clerk, on request. This includes correspondence discussed.

It is easy to criticise the activities of new generations, but times change. Experience from organisations that have hitherto relied on goodwill, ad hoc arrangements and subjective understanding, shows how easy it is to get into an unholy mess, with hurt feelings and broken relationships. The Parish Council, as a public body, is right to make sure its dealings are clear-cut, open, and recorded so understood by all.

Meetings of the Parochial Church Council (PCC) have different rules, and are not 'held in public'. Deliberations are confidential. Many villagers who are not regular churchgoers might therefore feel these meetings are irrelevant to them, even if they were aware. However, when they result in the maintenance of an historic and significant building in our community, or a spectacular event such as the Flower Festival at the Tercentenary, something of the PCC's efforts can be recognised.

In contrast to the two types of meeting described above, Abbotts Ann Housing Project team organised a full 'public meeting' in January to introduce, and seek, ideas for helping villagers who would like to remain here, but who cannot find suitable accommodation.

The school hall was packed. Speakers explained how the project had developed from the Village Consultation. A housing needs survey subsequently conducted by an external body, in conjunction with the Borough Council, had assessed that there was a need for some fifteen new 'affordable' houses. These would be intended for people with village connections who could not afford open market prices – children raised here, for instance, who want to stay near their families and to continue to support the local amenities. Some of the new houses could be for existing house-owners who might wish to 'downsize', thus releasing their house for a larger family.

There are many options to be discussed before the final format is decided and the organisers encouraged everyone to express their opinions and become involved. Sadly, some young people who had attended remarked afterwards that the plans did not seem to be 'for the likes of them'. If the 'affordable' housing were unaffordable for the very people it is supposed to help, there would surely be something wrong.

The Countryside Group met in February, led by John and Julie Moon. New members would be welcome as it is vital to spread the knowledge and understanding of our fascinating environment for future generations.

Another invaluable village organ is the parish magazine itself – compiled by volunteers, with unseen hard work and commitment, bringing news and views to the community and helping foster a united interest.

We are lucky to have so many willing and able to keep the village the vibrant place it is. In the past, many unsung individuals quietly carried out good deeds, such as the gentleman who would anonymously deliver firewood to the needy; or those who, unasked, made necessary repairs, or cut grass, or tidied up, or visited the lonely. It's what villagers do.

Incidentally, what villagers do **not** do is help themselves to piles of logs – they know it belongs to the owner of the fallen tree!...

Finally, following the recent vote, the telephone kiosk will become an information point, to include some of the history of the village. Let's hope it's not 'post-history, alternative history and nothing like history' – insofar as the documents of true history can be made publicly available!

ABBOTTS ANN PARISH COUNCIL CHAIRMAN'S COLUMN

A busy month on the Parish Council again. Two trees fallen across footpaths have been removed this month as one off jobs. The future annual maintenance contract will be an improvement on the previous approach. The first council meeting held in private discussed the commercially confidential bids for the contract to maintain the footpaths and churchyard. The Clerk presented the bids to councillors without disclosing the bidders names, the decision was to request a re-bid having cut the requirement to reduce costs.

Councillors had no objection to one tree and five planning applications. Councillors did object to the siting of a garden studio being too close to a garden wall with potential damage caused by its foundations and lack of space for maintenance. Councillors also objected to the proposed new developments on the Andover Business Park; the new jobs these sites will bring are great for local job prospects – however the proposal lacks a quality traffic management plan which may blight Abbotts Ann, with traffic using it as a rat run.

We were also notified by Hampshire County Council that they were going to close the road between Monxton and Abbotts Ann for up to a year – pretty dramatic stuff! On further investigation with our borough and county councillor's help, we've learned that HCC need to de-silt the pool in Monxton plus some other drainage repairs and resurfacing – although still in design it should only require a road closure for a few days over the 12 months and they'll make sure that local residents have access to their premises.

The rejuvenation of the Telephone Box will continue as soon as weather permits. The poll online and in the village shop resulted in the following outcome. A clear preference for an information point. Something that Cllr Haigh will be leading as part of her portfolio.

HOUSING PROJECT MEETING, 19.1.17

Could this have been one of the largest village meetings for some years? On Thursday 19th January 125 people packed the Village School Hall to hear proposals for a small development of homes by the village for the village.

As they arrived they were offered a drink and invited to inspect the exhibition stands in the centre of the room.

Then, as they took their seats around tables, the presentation gave details of what it is all about:

- Last year's housing needs survey showed significant demand for both affordable housing and for housing for people to downsize. A development of fifteen homes is proposed. People were reassured to be told that this is a local scheme for and by local people and no commercial developer is involved in it – indeed it may well make such commercial developments much less likely in the future.
- There are good reasons for such a development in our community – keeping people in our community by providing affordable homes, which makes possible continuity down the generations; strengthening the institutions we value – shop, school, pub, and church; and not letting money be the only qualification for living in our village – the argument for fairness.
- Those attending were pleased to hear that everything humanly and legally possible will be done to ensure that the affordable homes built will remain within the control of the village by setting up a Community Land Trust. For more information about CLTs see: <http://www.communitylandtrusts.org.uk/what-is-a-clt>
- Many people came with the question 'where will they be built?' and were pleased to hear that there is a carefully thought-out process for identifying and acquiring a site, which will include consulting the village. This consultation began at the meeting as people were invited to give their priorities for selecting the site (everything from its impact on the village scene to the cost of the land).

The meeting was then thrown open for a wide-ranging question and answer session which demonstrated the level of interest in the project. Ray Lucas was able to reassure everyone that the development is by the village for village people and that everything possible will be done to keep the homes in the ownership of the village in perpetuity. Whilst questions were thoughtful and perceptive, no opposition was expressed to the scheme proposed.

The Steering Group is delighted that a dozen people indicated that they would like to help in a variety of ways to take this project forward. If, reading this, you would like to help, please contact Beth Deacon or Ray Lucas.

Common remain unfrozen in the middle. Having admired the patterns and picked up great sheets of ice, the Tribe finally take great pleasure in shattering the ice - a little violent, but no one else was around and no harm was done!

One particular robin flies onto a shrub just outside the window by the sink; he looks at me through the glass with intelligent jet black eyes and cocks his head. I just enjoy watching him; or is it a her? It is almost impossible to tell as they both have red breasts. Robins' eyes are currently being studied by scientists as unique among avian animals. Scientists believe that robins are able to visualise the earth's magnetic field, allowing them to navigate effectively. The process is called 'magnetoreception'. Pretty impressive for such a small bird. A tiny wren flits amidst the protective cover of evergreen shrubs. Wrens have a powerful song and are quite shy birds; you are much more likely to hear them than see them. An interesting fact about wrens, they've been around for quite some time as there is fossil evidence of wrens dating from the last Ice Age. A gaggle of noisy goldfinches appear one day - a glorious burst of sunshine with their bright red faces, yellow wings and gregarious ways. In contrast, a quiet, but no less striking bullfinch, flies in another day. He is beautiful with his pink-red breast, neat black cap, bill and tail. The Littlest is enjoying learning about the different garden birds that we see.

Snowdrops are finally poking their pure white heads through the ground and along Cattle Lane the first few trees shake their catkins jauntily in the wind. A few days later however, damp weather returns with heavy fog that seems to last all day. Everything feels cold. But the overwhelming theme for the month is cold sunshine and enough frost on the ground for it to appear as snow. In between the Boy sail training, the girls playing netball and hockey and everyone playing tennis, we still just about find time for plenty of family walks. And despite the usual busyness of life, it feels like a quietly calm (on a personal level) beginning to 2017 and I feel that nature reflects my mood.

coins currently in circulation are in fact counterfeit. The new £1 coin includes a number of anti-counterfeit features such as: milled edges - with grooves on alternate sides; micro-lettering - tiny lettering on the inside rim of both sides of the coin; a latent image - a hologram-like image that changes from a '£' symbol to the number '1' when the coin is seen from different angles. The Royal Mint, which produces the coin, has stated it is the 'most secure coin in the world'.

The coin's design is said to showcase the UK's heritage and craftsmanship and includes the fifth coin portrait of Her Majesty the Queen (designed by Royal Mint coin designer Jody Clark). It also features a design by David Pearce that shows the English rose, the Welsh leek, the Scottish thistle and the Northern Irish shamrock emerging from one stem within a royal coronet.

Post Office Ltd will play a key role in launching this coin into circulation, as the intention is to take £330m from The Royal Mint – almost a quarter of the £1.5 billion coins they are producing.

David Bowie special stamps issue - On Sale 14th March 2017

Bowie made his breakthrough with the 1969 album Space Oddity. In 1972 he recorded The Rise and Fall of Ziggy Stardust and the Spiders From Mars establishing him as a leader of glam-rock. His 1975 album Young Americans began his "plastic soul" period, and in the 1980s he established a more elegant rock presence with hits like "Under Pressure" and "Let's Dance". Bowie also had hits with, Lou Reed, John Lennon, Mick Jagger, Iggy Pop, Mott the Hoople and Brian Eno.

LIFE WITH THE TRIBE - JANUARY 2017

The first day of the new year is overcast and wet but fortunately this quickly changes and the last day of the Tribe's holidays is celebrated with an icy walk on Stockbridge Common. The sky is brilliant blue but the air is freezing and the frozen ground is covered in a heavy frost that looks like snow. The Tribe enjoy the sharp clean air and there are shouts of delight as they break off large pieces of ice from frozen puddles. The puddles are a milky white colour and have an interesting pattern of concentric circles. So to the science bit. It seems that the white colour of the ice is due to the presence of minute air bubbles and these are due to the fact that as the skies were clear overnight and the air temperature quickly plummeted the water froze quickly thereby trapping the air within the ice. As the puddles froze quickly the ice contracted and caused cracking of the ice. As the water loses more energy to the colder air, ice forms, starting at the most shallow, outer rim of the puddle. With every drop in temperature more ice forms on the edges of that which is already frozen, thus creating the circular patterns. So, the patterns show the timeline of the freezing process, from the edge of the puddle to the middle. Many of the puddles on the

CH.2146/S PRIVATE EDWARD SAMUEL ALDERMAN ,RMLI

Following the publication of Edward's biography in the February edition of the Parish Magazine, I have been contacted by Miss Constance Morrell who is Edward's niece. Miss Morrell has helpfully noted the following errors in the biography.

Firstly Edward's rank was as a Private and NOT as a Marine. Secondly, Edward was born at Flinty Cottages, Chute Forest and NOT Chute. Readers may be interested to know that the hospital in Glasgow which Edward was evacuated to in 1918 was part of a building belonging to The North British Locomotive Company. They offered it to the Scottish branch of the British Red Cross Society in 1914. It closed in May 1919.


Edward died on 6th January 1975 one day after his 76th birthday.

ISA Tax-year end deadlines

Under the current ISA rules, customers have a £15,240 ISA limit for the 2016/2017 tax-year. In addition to a higher than ever allowance, customers have the flexibility to choose how they split their money between different ISA types. With the end of the tax year customers can save up to £15,240 into a Post Office Money Cash ISA this tax-year (subject to any Non-Cash ISA contributions).

Post Office Money only offers Cash ISAs. If customers do not make use of their annual ISA allowance by the tax year end, they will lose it forever.

Key dates for submitting applications

Monday 27 March: Last day to accept applications in branch with a payment from another Post Office Money savings product.

Thursday 30 March: Last day to apply in branch.

Thursday 30 March: The last recommended date to post an application together with the account opening cheque.

Saturday 1 April: The last day to top up an existing Premier Cash ISA in branch.

Wednesday 5 April: The last date for completed applications to be accepted by One Family.

Any applications received after this date cannot be accepted for the 2016/17 tax year.

Dates given are subject to applications being received at OneFamily by 5 April, including applications being handed in at a Post Office branch, and ID checks being successfully completed.

Thursday 6 April: The new tax-year begins and the new annual ISA allowance is £20,000 for the 2017/18 tax year.

Applications for the new tax-year will be accepted from Thursday 6 April.

The new £1 coin
