Private Howell was discharged to the Z Reserve as a Lance Corporal on 10 February 1919 and freed from any further military commitment on 31 March 1920 after 20 years and 146 days service. His discharge address was to 20 Abbotts Ann

Alfred Howell died on 19 October 1954 aged 73 years. He is buried in St Mary's Churchyard, Abbotts Ann. His service to his country is commemorated on the memorial panel inside the War Memorial Hall, Abbotts Ann.

He was entitled to the 1914-15 Star and the British War and Allied Victory medals

5703 PRIVATE ALFRED HOWELL
THE ROYAL BERKSHIRE REGIMENT
(PRINCESS CHARLOTTE OF WALES'S)

Alfred Howell was born in Hampstead Norris near Newbury in 1881, the son of Enos Howell, a shepherd, and his wife Harriet. Alfred had no siblings. He is not shown on the 1901 Census as he was serving abroad and on the 1911 Census he is shown as a farm labourer living in Abbotts Ann.

Alfred Howell enlisted into the Royal Berkshire Regiment at Reading on 6 November 1899 aged 18 years and 8 months. It was noted on his enlistment medical that he had slight varicosity on his right leg, a small scar on the back of his head and a tattoo on his left forearm. He served with the 1st Battalion in Gibraltar from 1900 to 1902 and with the 2nd Battalion in Egypt from 1902 to 1906. Whilst with the 2nd Battalion, he was admitted to hospital in Alexandria on 2 April 1904 suffering from a dog bite and attended the Cairo Institute for 23 days for daily rabies injections. During his first period of service he was employed as a Regimental Policemen, in the ammunition magazine and as an officer's servant, as well as an infantry soldier in a rifle section, and earned 3 good conduct badges. His transfer documents to the Army Reserve on 5 November 1907, when the 2nd Battalion was garrisoned in Dublin, stated that his conduct and character was exemplary, he was sober, honest, hardworking, clean, trustworthy and intelligent.

Howell is probably fairly typical of the many time served Regular soldiers who returned to the Colours as Reservists in 1914. He was mobilised on 5 August 1914 to the 2nd Battalion and entered France on 19 March 1915. But, on 27 March 1915 he was evacuated to England suffering from varicose veins – not something an infantry soldier would wish to have given the requirement to march up to 25 miles a day.

Private Howell stayed with the Royal Berkshire Regiment in the 1st (Home Service) Garrison Battalion until he was transferred to 629 Employment Company of the Labour Corps at Portsmouth in 29 Jun 1917, this resulting from a medical board at Portsmouth on 26 May 1917 which graded him as C2 (free from serious organic diseases, able to stand service in garrisons at home, to walk 5 miles, see and hear sufficiently for ordinary purposes).

Private Howell was next transferred to 257 Protection Company in 14th Battalion Royal Defence Corps from the Labour Corps on 22 June 1918. The Royal Defence Corps was formed by converting the (Home Service) Garrison battalions of line infantry regiments. Garrison battalions were composed of soldiers either too old or medically unfit for active front-line service; the Home Service status indicated they were unable to be employed overseas. The role of the Royal Defence Corps was to provide troops for security and guard duties inside the United Kingdom, guarding key point locations such as ports or bridges and also prisoner-of-war camps.

Anniversaries

Anniversaries are quite important in life and cover so many aspects of our lives. They might be birthdays, very important when you are young, but not quite so welcome when you are getting older. They might be wedding anniversaries, which seem to be the other way round in importance. Starting with basic things like paper, cotton, and wood, moving on through silk, lace, and crystal, before the very special, silver, gold, and diamond! We are now so often reminded by the media of the more serious anniversaries which are connected with wars and terrorism such as D-Day, battles, tragedies, the Twin Towers and so on. Whatever anniversary it might be they have one common theme – they are all recording the passage of time. Time moves on day by day, month by month, and year by year, then decade by decade, and even century by century.

I have been looking carefully at my own anniversaries as I approach the situation where travel insurance will cost more than the ticket for the holiday. And time which seemed to flow so slowly when I was at school, now very disconcertingly seems to be gathering pace!

I can hardly believe I trained and entered the Reader ministry almost twenty-five years ago, and can scarcely remember the admission service in Bristol which was taken by the then Dean of Bristol Cathedral Wesley Carr. Most of my ministry was at St John's, Haydon Wick in Swindon under the guidance of Rev Alistair Mort and Rev Raymond Adams. Raymond has an anniversary lunch coming up too – he will have been at St John's twenty-five years in November. I remember welcoming him into the church because I was churchwarden.

The last few years have been very different, switching from Bristol diocese to Winchester and a new boss – Rev Canon John Harkin. It was my good fortune that he sent me to minister in Pastrow benefice with Rev Canon Jill Bentall where I have been for the last three years. And that really great chapter taking more than fifty services, came to an end last week with the welcome arrival of Rev Alex Randle-Bissell.

But a new chapter has now started here at St Mary's, All Saints, and St Peter's and I am sure it will be just as memorable as all that has gone before. I think we will all face new challenges but the amazing thing we need to remember is that God is in charge. And although we might be worried about what the future might bring, we are all in God's hands and if we just try to seek his will, all will be well. Isn't God absolutely wonderful!

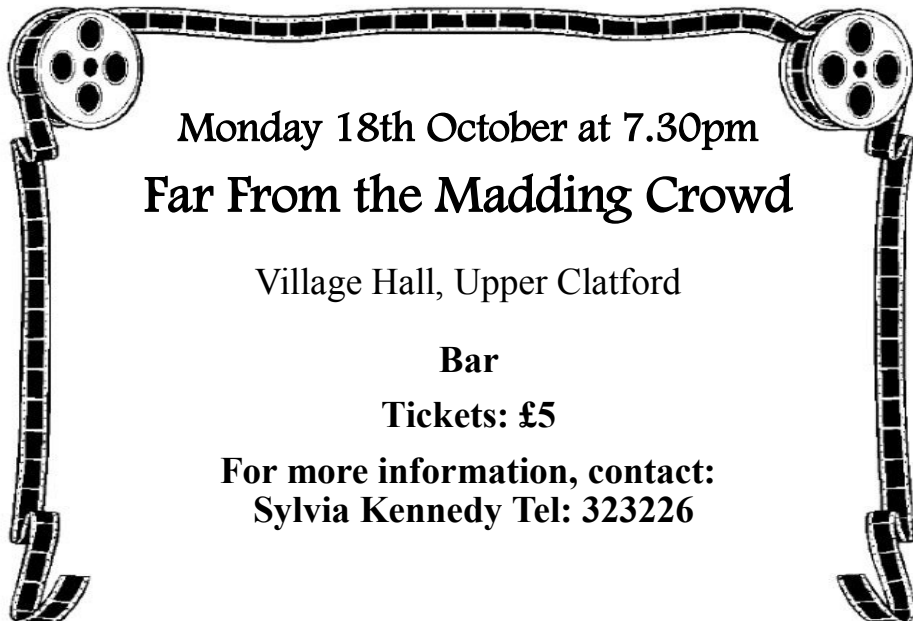

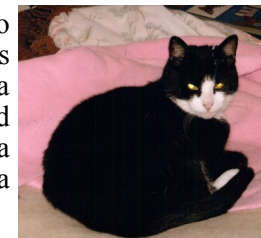

CLATFORD VALLEY GARDENING CLUB

‘Taking a Stand’ was the subject of the August Meeting of the Gardening club, when Christine Hayward gave us an insight into the large amount of work that goes into putting on a display at Hampton Court Show. Christine and her husband Keith hold the National Collection of Cannas in their garden near Farnborough. They also own a nursery near Woking in which Keith planted 4,000 Cannas last year.

Set up day at Hampton Court starts for them at 4.30 am when they load up all the plants and drive to the showground which they have to enter via the exhibitors’ entrance and then pass through all the tight security measures. When they arrive at their allotted destination the stand area is already marked out for them, so they unload as quickly as possible as all vehicles and rubbish must be removed by 9.30.

They first started exhibiting in 2003, when unfortunately their display was disqualified for two main reasons, firstly, the black plastic pots holding the flowers were visible and secondly, the display was not thought to be artistic enough. The following year they covered the pots with moss and included a small pond to make it more artistic and were rewarded with silver medal. From 2006 onwards their displays were themed, ‘Memories of Christopher Lloyd’ (2006), ‘The Role of Public Parks In Canna Conservation (2007), ‘Argentina’ (2009) and ‘Joys and Duties of Holding a National Collection (2010). Each time the judges found faults such as, including a plant with no flowers, and not enough educational material’ until in 2010 they hit perfection with a Gold Medal. Their efforts in 2009 resulted in a change in the rules, because they wore Argentinean dress, which was somewhat frowned on, and was banned thereafter. The same year was difficult for them because the weather was so bad that they could not start erecting their display until the Saturday and it has to be ready by Sunday.

Monday is the press and judging day, and everyone has to leave the marquee whilst judging is taking place after which the marks are explained to each exhibitor. To ensure fairness there is an overall moderator who in fact, judges the judges. After thousands of visitors have passed through, everything is dismantled on Sunday evening. In 1013 they also exhibited at Tatton Park when their volunteer helpers planned and erected the stand and were very pleased to be awarded a Silver Gilt.

The next Meeting is on 28th October and is the Annual General Meeting.

ABBOTTS ANN PARISH COUNCIL

Two honorary official posts, of **TREE WARDEN** and **FOOTPATHS OFFICER** for the Parish Council, are currently vacant.

The Tree Warden helps to advise the Parish Council on applications for tree works in the village – for tree pruning, felling, lopping, topping, etc. It is an important role in this rural setting, and ideally, the Warden should have some experience and knowledge of forestry or of trees generally.

The Footpaths Officer reports to the Parish Council on the condition of the parish's footpaths, rights of way, tracks, etc. He or she will be someone who enjoys walking the extensive paths on a regular basis, and can be proactive in reporting problems, or in dealing with minor clearance personally. Ideally, he or she should have some knowledge of rights of way law and related matters.

Apple Cake competition Bring your specially-baked apple cake and enter the competition for the best. (two competitions – 12 years and under; 13+ – including adults of course) Please bring it to the Hall by 12.00 noon for judging.

Apple juice! Bring along your container (any size) and fill it from the mega-press.

What about the children? Children (under supervision!) love to press their own apples on the small-scale press. Lots of games for children too.

Apples become cider Bring your own container (any size) labelled with your name and fill with juice from the mega-press. Hand it to Tim Abram (he of the shop), who will be nearby. He'll answer any questions, write you a ticket, and ask you to pay 50p per litre to cover the cost of production (no profit to him!). Around 14th-28th November call at the Village Shop to collect your cider (80% of the volume you handed over). It will be still (not fizzy) farmhouse cider. Quality and taste can't be guaranteed as they depend on the varieties used to make the juice.

Chatting with Lisa and Robbie about caring for your apple trees Lisa and Robbie Morgan own a small orchard in the village and will be around to talk with anyone who would like to know more about care of apple trees. Look out for them!

We are away for much of August and it is mostly a wonderful holiday month of long sunshine filled days. Just before we return home however, we are contacted by the friend who is looking after the Tribe's cats. PARISH COUNCIL – SEPTEMBER MEETING

At their latest meeting, councillors were very sorry to say “goodbye” to the locum clerk, Amy Taylor, who stood in at short notice in March and has been a stalwart support ever since. She has dealt efficiently, knowledgeably and cheerfully with a new council of largely inexperienced members at the busiest time of the year. However, Amy already has other councils for which she is the permanent clerk and Abbots Ann has therefore advertised over the past few weeks for candidates to fill the vacancy.

Business discussed in September included the purchase of public seating for The Green. Cllr Sally Coffey had already bought three seats locally, spending under the £500 figure previously authorised by the council for one seat only. She had been anxious that residents would be able to enjoy them while there still remained some summer! Two were quickly installed by the village shop manager, Tim Abram, voluntarily, and residents were soon happily making use of them. However, the Big Bad Wolves of Health and Safety, and Compliance, growled menacingly in the wings.

Quite properly, Cllr Andrew Hayter was concerned that any seats purchased by the council for public use should conform to regulations. Cllr Susie Bleeker concurred, relating that she had unfortunately, in her professional career, experienced having to tell generous donors that seats given in memory of loved ones were not suitable.

This raised another issue, as the Children’s Playpark has been given such a memorial seat by the daughters of two former residents, and it was due to be erected last week-end. Following the council’s discussions, this was postponed while further checks were made. Enquiries were made of RoSPA (who undertake the Playpark annual safety checks); the council’s insurers; TVBC; HCC; Health and Safety Executive; and several manufacturers and suppliers. None of these august bodies was aware of any specific regulations. The insurers and RoSPA advised that it was a matter of common sense whether a seat was likely to be safe or not. So, hopefully, the third seat at The Green and the memorial seat in the War Memorial Hall Playpark will both be in place very soon.

The Green needs pedestrian access from Manor Close, and it was at first suggested that a wicket gate be purchased. Again, there are recommendations and rules about this, and furthermore roadworks would need to be authorised to alter the kerb. An alternative is lockable posts which would be fixed far enough apart for pushchairs and wheelchairs, but not enough for cars to get through. The posts could be unlocked and removed for field maintenance work. Councillors liked this idea, and a local manufacturer has been approached.

Cllr Bernard Griffiths thanked the former Tree Warden, Dr John Moon, for continuing to offer his expert opinion on tree works applications. However, he

does wish to stand down from the post and so the council is still looking for another keen arboriculturalist to take over.

Cllr Hayter had prepared a schedule showing the actions in the council’s pipeline. This was welcomed by councillors as being very helpful for their own use and also enabling parishioners to see what progress is being made. Cllr Brian Sims noted that he had, for instance, been raising the subject of drainage on the A343 by Little Ann Bridge, and the speed of traffic and St John’s Cross, for very many years.

Cllr Beth Deacon reported on a meeting with the village webmaster, Keith Saunders. Only about 130 residents are registered on the village e-mail site, and it is hoped many more will sign up. The e-mail site is an excellent means of contacting people urgently, without any effort on their part. The message just arrives in your e-mail in-box, and Keith ensures that your private details are secure.

Traffic is still of great concern to residents. There have been incidents only recently in Little Ann Road and St John’s Cross, and there is speeding down Red Post Lane. The parish council had some time ago expressed keen interest in a traffic speed watch scheme, perhaps joining with another parish, but their approaches had not met with positive response. Amy Taylor felt that the time might now be right to try again, and although the parish council has no powers over traffic matters, it can at least continue to bring pressure on the County Council for action. County Councillor Andrew Gibson has already agreed to a site meeting in the village.

The railings outside the War Memorial Hall had been damaged earlier in the year by contractors from Carillion Telent. Numerous attempts at resolving the situation had not been successful, until Cllr Griffiths finally wrote a firm letter to the CEO. The railings have now been removed for repair by Carillion Telent.

A resident had asked whether the council could provide allotments, since these had disappeared from the village over the years. Cllr Sims had confirmed out of meeting that all the allotments in the village had been on private land, not council property, and had been gradually sold off by the landowners. The position in law is that if six residents petition the council, it must provide allotments – but the question is, where? It is a stipulation of the lease of the former Manor Close Playing Field (The Green) that there can be no allotments there. There may need to be some research into the possibilities of compulsory purchase or rental of land.

The next meeting of the Parish Council will be Thursday, 1st October, at 7.00 pm in the War Memorial Hall (Jubilee Room), and all are welcome.
